The contract is 6 NT , North has bid diamonds. The lead is $\diamond \mathrm{K}$ and south discards a heart, how would you play this contract?

## Solution:

To make this 6 NT , you should strip south's club and play the $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} 9$ to the small if North doesn't cover with $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} 10$ or $\uparrow$.

North lead a $\wp \mathrm{K}$ against your $4 \boldsymbol{\$}$ contract. You won by your ace and played $\boldsymbol{\$}$. Both defenders followed. How would you play this contract?

## Solution:

It seems that you should endplay north by heart. But this line will fail if north have only one diamond. South will win the diamond at some point and return a club. You can't do anything to save any of the 4 losers. The correct link is to play $\boldsymbol{\uparrow} \mathrm{K}$ and another 4 to dummy's $\mathbf{~} 5$. and finesse a diamond right away. If the finesse holds you can cash $\diamond A$ to cut down the connection on diamonds between defenders. Then you can endplay North by exiting a heart and north can't avoid giving you a ruff \& sluff or a free finesse. If the finesse lost to North, then you can set up the diamonds to pitch one club loser.
